MISSION AND VALUES

Hospitality - Maria College is marked by a dedication to diversity and inclusion and a warm and generous welcome to all, as well as compassionate outreach to both campus and community members and groups.

Symbols and Traditions

The custom of wearing academic regalia dates back to the 12th century when caps and gowns marked the formal admission to the body of Masters. The gowns served a practical purpose to protect teachers from the cold buildings of the time. Many of these early teachers were monks; therefore the hoods resembled a monk's cowl that attached to the gown and could be pulled over the head. Later versions featured a detached hood.

REGALIA

The European tradition of academic regalia traveled to the United States. In 1895, the United States adopted a specific code for academic apparel that has had slight modifications since its adoption. Until the Civil War, students at most American universities wore caps and gowns daily while in residence. Today, the academic regalia is reserved for special occasions like inauguration and commencement ceremonies.

THE GOWN

The gown is made from a black material, or signifying colors of the institution, with varying degrees of fullness. The sleeves indicate a person's academic credentials. Those with a bachelor's degree have long, pointed sleeves and the gown is worn with a closed front. A person with a master's degree wears the gown open with a distinctive full-length square sleeves that are crescent shaped at the bottom. The doctoral gowns are worn closed and have velvet panels on the front with full, round open sleeves with three cheverons. Presidential regalia has four chevrons.

THE HOOD

Academic hoods tell an individual's academic story. The hood is three and a half feet long and has velvet edging. The colors of the edging indicate the discipline: apricot (nursing), brown (architecture and fine arts), citron yellow (social work), crimson (journalism/communications), dark blue (philosophy), gold (science), green (medicine), lemon (library science), light blue (education), drab (business), orange (engineering), peacock blue (public administration), pink (music), purple (law), sage green (physical education), scarlet (theology), and white (arts and humanities).

THE CAP

Academic caps vary by institution. Some use black mortarboards with black or colored tassels that relate to the conferred degree. Gold tassels are frequently worn for doctoral degrees. Some institutions have adopted a tam instead of the traditional mortarboard.

REGALIA FOR PRESIDENT ORTALE

President Ortale wears a specially designed gown of Maria College blue with four navy chevrons indicating her rank as President. The gown includes the new College icon, created to include the design of the stained-glass windows found in Marian Hall. The velvet of her hood is dark blue and gold, representing her Ph.D. with satin blue and gold representing Maria College. Her eight-sided tam is topped with a metallic gold tassel.

COLLEGE MACE

Maria College ceremonial occasions begin with the entrance of the College mace, carried by a designated mace bearer. The mace bearer for the Commencement ceremony of Maria College is Assistant Professor of English and Senior Academic Advisor, Anne Devlin, MA.

The mace symbolizes the College's governing authority and is present only when the president and trustees are in attendance. It signifies the proceedings have official sanction.

The tradition of the mace derives from medieval times in England, when the mace was held by a bodyguard for dignitaries at ceremonial functions. Ceremonial maces are used by governing bodies worldwide, including the U.S. House of Representatives and the British Parliament.

THE COLLEGE SEAL

The Maria College seal combines a series of symbols characterizing the purpose, not only of the College, but also of the Sisters of Mercy who established the College. The name "Maria" honors Our Lady of Mercy, patroness of the Sister of Mercy.

An open book, the heraldic indication of a college, occupies the center field of the seal. On the left is a shield with red and gold bars topped with a Maltese cross. This shield connotes Mercy, the essence of all Divine attributes and the distinctive feature of the humanitarian objectives undertaken by the Foundress of the Sisters of Mercy, Catherine McAuley. The Chi-Rho on the right represents the Christocentric training, the core of the College curriculum.

The crown at the top-center is a tribute to the patroness of Maria College, the Queen of Heaven. A cross reaching from crown to book symbolizes the farreaching principles permeating all phases of Maria College life.

THE PRESIDENTIAL MEDALLION

Each president of Maria College has worn a medallion embossed with the seal of the College and the names and tenure of each past president. President Ortale, sixth president of Maria College, will wear the chain today for Maria College's 62nd Commencement ceremony.
